*Title:* "Beijing+30: towards achieving gender equality, the rights and empowerment of women and girls"

#### Background

**2025** will mark the thirtieth anniversary of the Fourth World Conference on Women and the adoption of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action (1995), as well as the tenth anniversary of the adoption of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

These anniversaries not only provide an opportunity to review the progress made in advancing the gender equality agenda, but also offer a platform to bolster global action towards gender equality and a gender-responsive implementation of the 2030 Agenda and other global commitments. These include those under Security Council resolution 1325 (2000) and subsequent resolutions on women, peace, and security; the Addis Ababa Action Agenda of the Third International Conference on Financing for Development (2015); the Paris agreement on climate change (2015); the ongoing review of progress on the implementation of the UNFCCC Gender Action Plan; and regional commitments to promote gender equality and the rights of women and girls, among others. As well as the implementation of the Pact for the Future, the Global Digital Compact and the Declaration on Future Generations.

Accelerating the fulfillment of global commitments to gender equality is crucial. Since the Beijing conference, significant strides have been made in securing legal and institutional frameworks for gender equality. Notably, 69% of countries now have specialized bodies to address gender discrimination, 78% provide budgetary commitments for services addressing violence against women (VAW), and 85% subsidize childcare. We have seen the impressive resilience of the women's movement, the emergence of feminist philanthropy, stronger engagement by the private sector to advance gender equality, and an increase in the dedicated resources to gender equality, rights and the empowerment of women, young women and girls, including the historic Spotlight Initiative to end violence against women and girls. However, in a context where, more than halfway to the endpoint of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, not a single country has achieved gender equality, thereby putting the achievement of the entire agenda at risk. The gender gap in decision-making and leadership positions, including the challenges towards an equal and inclusive representation of women in decision-making systems, remains entrenched, and, at the current rate of progress, gender parity will not be reached in national legislatures before 2063, or among Heads of Government before 2150 - another 130 years away. No country is close to eradicating violence against women and girls, including intimate partner violence, with an estimated 736 million almost one in three - subjected to violence at least once in their lifetime. According to the latest 'Progress on the Sustainable Development Goals: The gender snapshot 2023' report from UN DESA and UN Women, if current trends continue, more than 340 million women and girls will still live in extreme poverty by 2030, and close to one in four will experience moderate or severe food insecurity. The next generation of women will still spend on average 2.5 more hours per day on unpaid care and domestic work than men, which will not only jeopardize the full realization of their human rights but also compromise their equal access to labor market and economic and financial autonomy.

Therefore, delivering the promise of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, through accelerated country level impact, galvanized civil society and youth movements, and a determined multilateral system to realize women's rights & gender equality for all is essential.

In preparation for CSW69, Member States are conducting national reviews to assess progress in the implementation of the Platform for Action, based on a guidance note to facilitate comprehensive national-level reviews.<sup>1</sup> UN-Women, together with the five regional commissions, is supporting Member States in their national review and appraisal processes that will culminate in Bejing+30 regional meetings in the Fall of 2024. These reports will also be the basis of the Secretary-General's global report assessing the implementation of the BPfA in the current context of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and make recommendations for accelerating progress towards gender equality, empowerment and rights of women, young women and girls.

In this context, between September 2024 and September 2025 a groundbreaking multi-stakeholder -Governments, UN System, youth, CSOs, private sector, etc. - and multi-pronged process at the national, regional and global levels will be rolled out, focusing on the 12 critical areas of concern of Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action and the respective SDGs. Additionally, a mobilization and engagement campaign to reach out to young people will be in place, fostering inclusive spaces, where young women and girls as rights holders are empowered to lead conversations, create content, and engage actively in the discussions related to the Beijing +30 process and in the global women's rights and gender equality movement.

## Objectives

The side event will 'kick-off' the Beijing+30 process, aiming at achieving three specific objectives:

- 1. Highlight the progress achieved on gender equality and underscore the persistent global and regional challenges, based on data and evidence;
- 2. Lay out the UN Women Beijing+30 strategic vision
- 3. Build energy, momentum and positive engagement on the Beijing+30 process across all stakeholders and countries.

Part 1: "Beijing Platform of Action – Then" to emphasize the start of global momentum and what has changed since then.
